ODA REPORTING OF IN-DONOR COUNTRY REFUGEE COSTS: SURVEY RESULTS

Background

1. The history of ODA recording of in-donor refugee costs is outlined in DCD/DAC/STAT(2005)13. To summarise:

- Early 1980s: There are no specific instructions on reporting aid to refugees, which is included indistinguishably under “Emergency and distress relief”. Members start debating which refugee costs might be covered.
- 1988: New Directives are issued that specify the coverage of ODA reporting of refugees. The first-year subsistence costs of refugees from developing countries arriving in donor countries are specifically allowed. These directives remain essentially unchanged to date, although the 2000 revision specifically included displaced persons within the coverage of refugees.
- 1992: Large amounts of ODA (of the order of USD 1 billion annually for the DAC aggregate) start being recorded as aid to in-donor country refugees.
- 1994: Following concerns expressed by a number of members, the Secretariat recommends phasing out ODA reporting of in-donor refugee costs, but no consensus is reached.
- 1999-2001: Switzerland funds a consultants’ study which reports considerable diversity in DAC members’ practices and views in relation to the ODA reporting of in-donor refugee costs. The study proposes more precise instructions to help standardise reporting, but the wide divergences of view among members preclude agreement.

2. At the 2005 meeting of the DAC Working Party on Statistics, Switzerland offered to fund a special survey of members’ ODA reporting of in-donor refugee costs to update the consultants’ study of this issue carried out in 2000 [DCD/DAC(2000)22]. The Secretariat accepted the offer and developed an appropriate questionnaire in consultation with the Swiss authorities. It circulated the questionnaire to members on 18 October 2005.

Responses

3. As at 4 May 2006, all DAC member countries had responded except for Italy (which did not notify costs under the relevant item on Table DAC1 in 2004). Annex 1 summarises the categories of refugees and the types of expenditures currently included in the ODA reporting of all members who have so far responded to the questionnaire, and Annex 3 contains members’ individual responses to the questionnaire, where these were provided.

Summary of results

4. Two members, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom, do not report any in-donor refugee costs as ODA. (Finland and Japan indicate that they do report, but no data were shown on the relevant reporting line for 2004.) The European Commission indicated to the February 2006 meeting of the Working Party

that it shares the view of Luxembourg and the United Kingdom that in-donor refugee costs should not be reported as ODA.

5. The other 19 responding members report at least some in-donor costs of refugees or asylum seekers as ODA. Of these, three members (France, Portugal and Switzerland) only report costs in respect of asylum seekers. Eleven members report costs of both asylum seekers and some categories of refugees, and the remaining five members only report costs in respect of some category of refugees, not in respect of asylum seekers.

Trends in reporting

6. The 2000 study showed that since reporting on this item commenced in the early 1990s, there had been a steady upward trend in the number of countries reporting at least some in-donor refugee costs as ODA. This trend has continued since 2000, with Belgium, New Zealand and Portugal having commenced reporting since the 2000 survey.

7. Several other countries have changed their assistance regimes or the scope of their ODA reporting. For example Sweden now includes rejected asylum seekers, as long as they are officially registered. In 2004, Austria extended the categories of refugees eligible for assistance; Portugal included for the first time data provided to the Portuguese Council for Refugees, an NGO that provides help to newly arrived refugees; and Switzerland started counting costs of asylum seekers.

8. The total amount reported by DAC members on the relevant line of Table DAC 1 has risen in recent years, but the rise is not large as a share of members' combined ODA. The total reported in 2000 was USD 1.36 billion (2.5% of ODA). By 2004, this had risen to USD 2.12 billion (2.7% of ODA). The rise in the ODA share of this item has been moderated by two factors: the substantial rise in ODA levels, and the slowdown in the numbers of refugees arriving in DAC countries, following the surge in the mid and late 1990s resulting from conflicts in ex-Yugoslavia. For complete historical data on this item, see Annex 2.

Follow-up action

9. The Chair of the Working Party on Statistics observed at its meeting of 21-22 February 2006 that the best way of standardising reporting in this area would be to drop this item, the ODA status of which has always been regarded as doubtful. However, he accepted that this was not realistic, given the present scale of reporting. However, in the interests of transparency, the Secretariat intends to propose the following changes in the revision of the Statistical Reporting Directives:

- i. Exclude in-donor refugee costs from the definition of humanitarian aid, and place it under the 900 series of purpose codes [following the suggestion of the Netherlands, cf. DCD/DAC/STAT(2006)7, paragraph 18].
- ii. Consistent with the Geneva Convention of 1951¹, specify that ODA recording of resettlement costs relates only to voluntary resettlement.

10. Members' views will be sought on these suggestions in separate documents.

- a) Austria: Assistance provided only during the first four months after being granted refugee status, in case of need (i.e. no job, no place to stay).
- b) Austria: No ODA for quota refugees has been reported since reporting year 2001 (operation for Kosovo ended in 2000).
- c) Canada: Convention refugees receive transport (loans for dependents abroad) and medical treatment only.
- d) Canada: Refugees granted the right to remain on humanitarian or protection grounds only receive medical treatment.
